
# It's "Go to An Art Museum" Day!



## Museum of Modern Art, New York City

The Museum of Modern Art (MOMA), located in midtown Manhattan, was the first museum devoted to the modern era. It started with an initial gift of eight prints and one drawing. Its collection now includes over 150,000 paintings, sculptures, drawings, photographs and design objects. Among its holdings are the following:





## Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York City


The Metropolitan Museum of Art, known colloquially as "The Met", is the largest art museum in the Americas. The main building is located on Fifth Avenue, along Museum Mile, on the eastern edge pf Central Park. Its permanent collection totals more than two million works. Here are just a few.



## The Art Institute of Chicago

Located in Grant's Park, the Art Institute of Chicago was founded in 1879; it holds close to 300,000 works of art and hosts more than 30 special exhibits annually. Among its permanent collection are the following well known works of art.





## National Gallery of Art, Washington, D.C.

Established by a joint resolution of Congress in 1937, the National Gallery of Art, located on the National Mall in Washington, D.C., is the only museum of the ten featured here to offer free admission. Its modern East Building was designed by the renowned architect, I.M. Pei. The National Gallery is the only museum in the Americas to have a Leonardo da Vinci painting in its collection. The museum's Da Vinci painting and several other masterpieces from its collection are shown below.

## Los Angeles County Museum of Art, Los Angeles


The Los Angeles County Museum of Art is on Wilshire Boulevard on Museum Row adjacent to the La Brea Tar Pits. It is the largest art museum in the western United States. Its collection exceeds 120,000 objects, dating from antiquity to the present. A few of its outstanding holdings are pictured below.

## Whitney Museum of American Art, New York City

The Whitney Museum of American Art, known as "The Whitney", is located in the Meatpacking District of Manhattan. Founded by Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney in 1930, the museum focuses on 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> century American art. Ms. Whitney founded the museum after the Met declined her gift of approximately 500 works of art that she had collected and MOMA seemingly was favoring modern European, rather than American, art. Among the works in The Whitney's permanent collection are the following:





#### Hirshhorn Museum and Sculpture Garden, Washington D.C.

The Hirshhorn Museum and Sculpture Garden was a gift to the nation from financier and avid collector of modern art, Joseph H. Hirshhorn. Once the breadth of Hirshhorn's collection became known, many museums courted him with offers of a museum for his holdings. In 1966, Hirshhorn announced that he would give his entire collection to the Smithsonian, to be housed in a museum named for him and constructed on the National Mall by the federal government. The initial gift numbered more than six thousand pieces of art, and Hirshhorn bequeathed the Museum an additional six thousand items and an endowment of five million dollars at his death. The Hirshhorn, designed by architect Gordon Bunshaft, was the first modern building on the National Mall. Below is a small representation of the works of art that can be viewed at the Hirshhorn.

#### **Getty Center**, Los Angeles

The Getty Center, located in the Brentwood neighborhood of Los Angeles, is a campus of the J Paul Getty Museum. The museum features pre-20th-century European paintings, drawings, illuminated manuscripts, sculpture, and decorative arts as well as photographs from the 1830s through present day from all over the world. The museum originally (1954) was situated in J Paul Getty's home in Pacific Palisades. Even with the addition of an Italian style villa on the property to house additional works of art, the collection eventually outgrew the available space and the Getty Center was constructed. During construction, an earthquake caused hairline cracks in the steel framework; the building was retrofitted before completion and is believed to be able to survive an earthquake of 7.5 magnitude. Among the museum's most prized works of art are shown below.
